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Parent-Child Relationship And Attitudes
Toward Alternative Lifestyles

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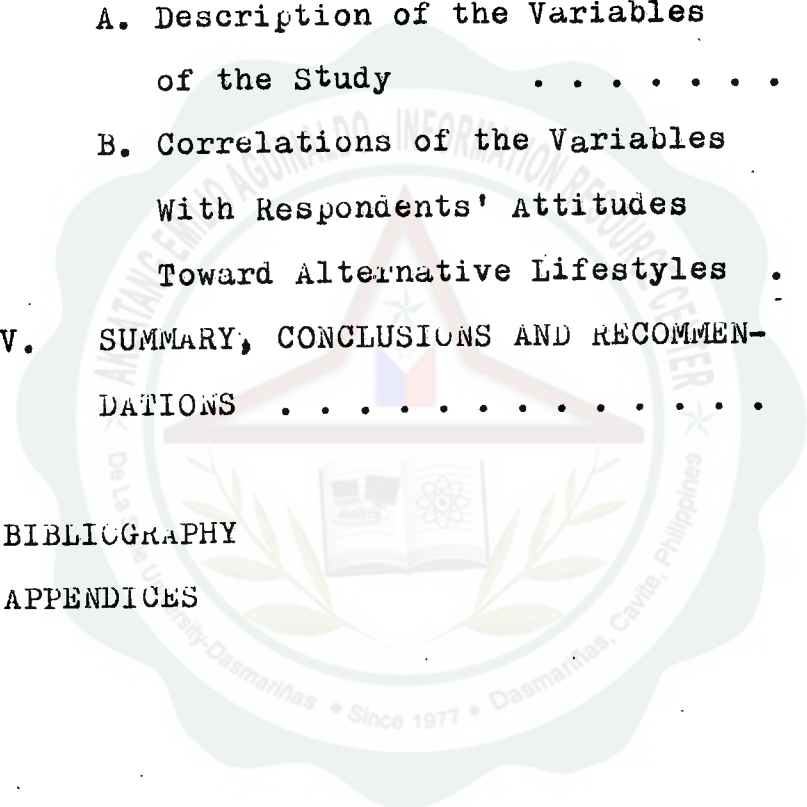
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ABSTRACT

The main aim of this study was to determine whether certain factors-- specifically parent-child relationships, perceived happiness of parents' marriage and parents' attitudes (as perceived by the respondents) toward alternative lifestyles --correlate with DLSU students' attitudes toward alternative lifestyles. The subjects chosen were 324 students of De La Salle University who were in the College of Liberal Arts and College of Business and Economics. Questionnaires were used for data gathering. Pearson r was used as the statistical tool in measuring the relationship between the variables. Significant correlations were obtained between parent-child relationship and respondents' attitudes toward alternative lifestyles; between perceived happiness of parents' marriage and respondents' attitudes toward alternative lifestyles; and between parents' attitudes (as perceived by the respondents) toward alternative lifestyles and respondents own attitudes toward alternative lifestyles.
