Objectives of the Study

General:

Find out the implications of child rearing practices of working and non-working mothers to social and moral development of adolescents in Dasmariñas National High School Annex C SY 1998 - 1999.

Specific:

1. Determine the profile of working and non-working mothers as to age, educational attainment, civil status, family income, and number of children.



- 2. Find out the child rearing practices of mothers when they are taken as a whole and when they are grouped as to working and non-working mothers.
- 3. Find out if there are significant differences in the child rearing practices of working and non-working mothers when grouped according to age, educational attainment, civil status, family income, and number of children.
- 4. Propose an action plan for parental training/education on child rearing practices, responsible parenthood, school-parent linkages, undertaking the nature of adolescents, and better understanding of the guidance program of parents, teachers, and administrators alike.

Descriptive method was utilized with questionnaire as the main data gathering instrument. There were 140 or 31% of the 450 mothers and their respective children in this study, 70 or 50% of whom were working mothers and the other 70 or 50% were non-working mothers. Data were analyzed through frequency count, percentage, average weighted mean, mean, and F-test or One Way ANOVA.

Findings of this study revealed that age and educational attainment were related to the child rearing practices of working and non-working mothers on F-ratio of 4.11 and probability of .0031 with tabular value of 2.29 and F-ratio of 3.57 and probability of .0127 with tabular value of 2.87, respectively. They are not related in terms of civil status, family income, and number of children.

Findings also revealed the following implications of child rearing practices of mothers on social and moral development of adolescents.



- 1. The mothers' practices were imbibed and reflected on the adolescents' social and moral behaviors and contributed much to their social and moral development.
- 2. About 87% of the mothers' child rearing practices in this study in the area of feeding, cleanliness, health and hygiene, discipline and punishment, socialization and moral aspect have helped develop the adolescents socially and morally.
- 3. The highly rated practices by the mothers and highly rated adolescents' social and moral development indicated that when child rearing practices of the mothers were done Always, these are internalized and manifested in the children's social and moral behavior as they develop into grown individuals.
- 4. The practices of mothers with the least average weighted mean when compared with the social development with the least average weighted mean of adolescents indicated that they were not learned and therefore were not manifested socially, and have no implication to social development.
- 5. The least rated rearing practices of mothers when compared with the least rated moral development of adolescents implied that whether the practices were done <u>Always</u>, <u>Frequently</u>, <u>Sometimes</u>, or <u>Rarely</u>, adolescents manifested moral development.
