# PARENTAL STRUCTURE AND MORAL REASONING OF SELECTED ADOLESCENTS: BASIS FOR GUIDANCE AND COUNSELING INTERVENTION PROGRAM

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#### **ABSTRACT**

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This descriptive-correlational study was undertaken to examine how parental structure is related to moral reasoning among selected adolescents particularly on the kind of ethical orientation used in dealing with moral issues and dilemmas. The sources of data come primarily on the responses of 713 secondary students of La Salle College Antipolo from 11 to 17 age range. To measure moral reasoning the researcher utilized the moral dilemma questionnaire of Francis Julius Evangelista (2004) and the researcher self-made moral issues and dilemmas checklist. The study employed quantitative supplemented with qualitative data.

The findings support that parental structure affects the moral reasoning of adolescents on the way they deal with moral issues and dilemmas on certain moral scenarios. Findings reveal that level of moral orientation of adolescents reasoned on care-orientation across dilemmas and a balanced orientation on adolescents with incomplete parents and care-orientations with complete parents across parental structure. Results show that adolescents' reason may vary depending on the moral issues and dilemmas they experience. Significant relationship and difference were found between parental structure and moral reasoning. The results of the study underscore the importance of formulating Guidance and Counseling intervention program to accelerate the moral reasoning of adolescents geared toward moral development.

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
